From the Director's Desk.....

Welcome to our first newsletter of the 2018-2019 school year! I hope you enjoy connecting with new staff and learning more about what's happening at Keystone and in Keystone districts in each of this year's editions. It is an exciting time for educators in Kansas for many important reasons - new funding and school redesign efforts being just two of them. We'll look at those more closely in the months ahead, but this month it's a good time to take a moment to reflect upon the life and sacrifices of a great American who happened to be handicapped.

John McCain died very recently. By the time you read this, his funeral will have taken place. At this moment, his story rightfully receives significant media attention. McCain was a self-described "maverick", so it's understandable that the responses to his life and his accomplishments have spanned a broad spectrum from statesman and hero to not so much. Regardless of where one might stand on that spectrum, it is worth taking note that McCain was a man who understood what it is like to live with significant handicapping conditions.

Thought to be highly intelligent by his peers and teachers, McCain earned low grades in math and science and admittedly struggled in those classes - so much so that he graduated near the bottom of his class at the US Naval Academy. Could it have been that he struggled with dyscalculia or a math disability? Such things weren't diagnosed in that time period so we'll never know for sure. Later McCain experienced the pain of torture and deprivation. He lived with physical limitations and pain through the remainder of his life. The emotional trauma was as significant as the physical disabilities he endured.

For our students with handicapping conditions, the teachable moment may well be found in the example McCain provided. He wasn't successful in all of his educational efforts, didn't achieve the success that close friends did, or rise to the level of achievement his father and grandfather established. He faced many political failures including defeat in his quest to become president. His example shows it's possible to change the conversation from one's disabilities and defeats, from what's not possible and what isn't accomplished to something greater - to the things we can do and the values we can aspire to. That's what makes America great.

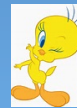

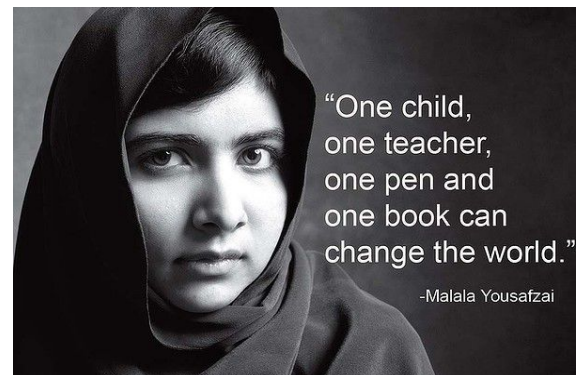

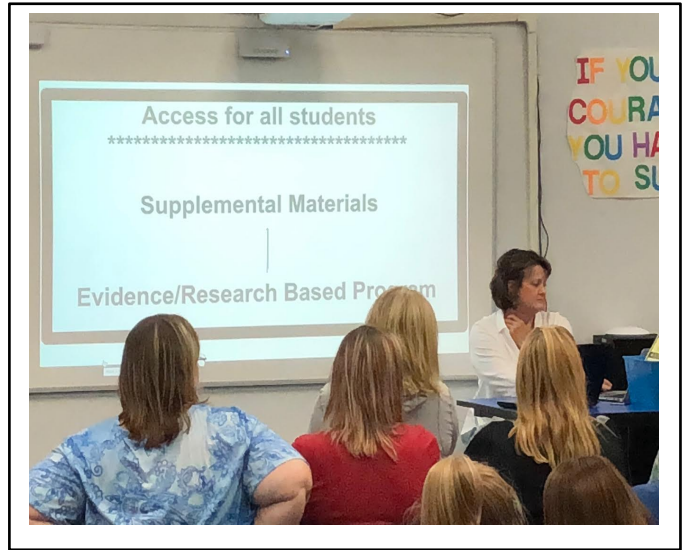
